

3. Suggestion of visits in the region

Lagos, the fishing town

One of the few Algarve holiday resorts to maintain its identity as a real town and not just a tourist destination, Lagos is a fishing port and market town first and a holiday spot second. The ancient walls of Lagos remain after certain areas were restored. Lagos was a fishing village and its importance grew under the Arabs, which built several fortifications. It turned into an important naval center in the age of the Discoveries, in the 15th century; became the capital of the Algarve from 1576 to 1756 and was greatly damaged by the earthquake of 1755; thus its beautiful 18th and 19th century buildings. A fine new marina welcomes boats sailing in from the Atlantic.

The beaches around Lagos are some of the most beautiful of the Algarve, Lagos travel to the area's beaches provide visitors with some of the most beautiful shores in the Algarve region. The most highly regarded beach in Lagos is Ponta da Piedade, a huge rock formation hollowed out by the sea, which shelters the bay of the area with its rocks, caves and beautifully transparent waters.



Sagres, the southwestern most point in the European continent

Sagres or the Promontorium Sacrum evokes the memory of the Infante D. Henrique and the Portuguese discoveries. Dating back from the Roman conquest times, it was in the 15th century that Sagres achieved great importance. The southwestern most point in the European continent was already referred to in antiquity as the Promontorium Sacrum, encompassing the area from the Ponta da Piedade to the Cape of São Vicente and from the cape to the beach of Arrifana.

On Ponta de Sagres, a giant finger of rock pointing to the ocean, stand the buildings which evoke the past of a place that is part of the history of the world, remembering the Vila and the defensive fortress founded by Henry the Navigator. A buttressed fortress was built in the 15th century by the Infante D. Henrique. The presence of this fortress endowed Sagres with a unique role in the history of Portugal, integrating it within the imaginary universe of the Portuguese discoveries and conferring international recognition to the site. In addition to the spectacular panorama over the sea and the Cape of São Vicente it is still possible to recognize constructions such as the cistern tower, a windbreak wall, the former dwellings and a barracks and the old parish church of Nossa Senhora da Graca.







Carvoeiro

Carvoeiro is a lively fishing village which has become popular during recent years, but still retains its local charm. The fishing boats come and go and fresh fish and locally produced fruit and vegetables can be purchased from the market. There are lovely sandy beaches for swimming or lazing in the sun around Carvoeiro, and other beautiful unspoilt beaches are also closeby. There are ample shops of handcrafts and plenty of friendly bars.



Silves

Located on a hill in the Serra de Monchique chain, Silves owes its foundation and development to the Arade river. This was long an important means of communication attracting settlers as far back as the Iron Age, 3,000 years before Christ. The Arade also proved the point of entry for the Romans that came to exploit the copper reserves and trade other products such as olive oil, wine, dried fruits and salt. In the 5th century, the Visigoths arrived and would stay until the 8th century when the southern regions of Portugal fell under Muslim domination. It was then that Silves became truly prosperous. The Castle and the Almohade Storage Well bare witness to the city's level of development at that time. The area around the Well is now part of the Silves Musem of Archaeology. With Silves being attributed a bishopdom, a cathedral was built on the site of the mosque. The silting up of the river, rendering it nonnavigable, and the bishopdom being transferred to Faro in the middle of the 16th century, was the beginning of a long, slow decline. Much destroyed in the 1755 earthquake would only be rebuilt during the industrial revolution of the 19th century with its development of the cork and dry fruit businesses. From that period date a series of houses belonging to the bourgeois who made their fortunes. The old cork factory was recently restored and transformed into a performance centre with regular events and a great deal of children's entertainment. The so-called English Factory has contributed to the city's revival and has swiftly turned into a centre for regional cultural development attracting large numbers of visitors.



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Alte, the hidden historical and rural Algarve

Some consider Alte, which has existed since the period of the Roman occupation to be the village most typical of the Algarve. With their whitewashed houses, windows and facades edged with colourful borders, ornate chimneys and pervasive air of tranquillity, the streets of Alte's historic centre have retained much of their original charm. The area around the church is a delightful snapshot of the real Algarve.

Alte has its own celebrated poet, Candido Guerreiro (1871 - 1953). Some of his verse is displayed on painted tile panels at a popular picnicking spot by a leafy stream at the bottom of the village. Much older tiles, some of them made in Seville in the 16th century, adorn the chapels inside the nearby parish church, which has a fine Manueline portal.



Faro, one of the most important cities in Algarve

It was during the Roman period that this region developed and gained standing. It was then known as Civitas Ossobonensis, with its borders stretching to where modern Tavira lies, and included a number of towns with specific productive, rural and maritime functions. This historical past come from interpreting archaeological finds made in the city which can now be seen in the Infante D. Henrique (Prince Henry the Navigator) Archaeological Museum, and the Milreu Ruins to be found in the suburbs of Faro. In the 19th century, Faro was administratively reorganised, centralising regional powers and, along with its role in the regional economy, became one of the most important cities in the Algarve. The nobility and bourgeois contributed to this urban renovation building palace-like residences. The wealthier families built second homes on the outskirts. These include the impressive Palace of Estói. On the outskirts of the city, the sheer beauty of the Ria Formosa Natural Park ensures it is well worth a visit.



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Albufeira

Albufeira is famed for its beaches, for the countless shades and tones of its rocks and cliffs. This is a place where people live to the rhythm of the great holiday destinations, sunbathing during the day and at sunset flocking to enjoy the restaurants, bars and discos that enliven the night-time hours. But just a few miles inland and everything changes. The green of the countryside is dotted with almond, fig, orange and pine trees and decorated chimneys stand out against the ochre of tiled roofs. Bucolic villages invite you to experience a way of life rooted in the traquility of nature, to add another dimension to your holidays. Sports are also a good reason to come and stay in Albufeira. Tennis, golf, water sports and much more make the delights of the most demanding sportsmen.
